with all of his ability, he is a modest and retiring man, even-tempered, and gets along exceedingly well with his co-workers. Everyone at the Army Security Agency had the highest regard for him, and professional jealousy of him was unknown.

I cannot wouch for his administrative ability, although I have no reason to doubt that he would not perform well here also. The reason for my lack of knowledge along this line is that his employment here was primarily concerned with technical and scientific problems of a research nature, and he was purposely relieved of administrative work to the greatest extent possible.

He is a man of the highest character, of unquestioned loyalty, and anyone employing him is to be envied.
